Counselor's Corner

Highland Park Super RoadRunners and Families,

For our Social and Emotional Learning lessons we are starting out the year talking about Goals and New Year's Resolutions. More Specifically we have been working on using daily intentions to find something we can do to work towards our goals each day. Setting daily intentions is exactly what it sounds like: students determine what they want to accomplish towards their bigger goals that day. This could be an academic goal, a behavior goal, or a social goal.

Setting daily intentions helps us to focus in on what we want and helps us to find a way to work towards that goal each day, so instead of starting tomorrow or next week we focus in one thing we can do today. To get started, talk to your kids about what they are hoping to accomplish today or how they would like to simply be during the day.

To help your child identify daily intentions, ask:

- What do you want to accomplish today?
- · How do you want to engage with others today?
- · How do you want to treat yourself and others today?
- What matters most to you?
- · Is there something you'd like to let go of today?
- · What would make you proud today?
- · What do you want to express gratitude for today?
- What are you doing when you feel like your best, truest self?

When they have set an intention, ask:

- · What will this look like in action?
- What will this sound like?
- How will you know you're working toward your intention?
- How will you feel when you work toward your intention?
- Why is this intention important to you?
- How will this intention help you be your best, truest self?

Library Corner

Our genre for January is Nonfiction. Classes have learned that Nonfiction gives you information and real facts. Grades 3-6 learned about five different types of Nonfiction (Text Structures) which are Description, Sequence, Cause and Effect, Compare and Contrast, and Problem and Solution. If your student is reading some Nonfiction be sure to ask them what their favorite fact is.

The due date for having at least five of the Battle Books read is January 31st. Students in grades 3-6 who do this will get to go to a pizza party and receive a prize.
